## HONORING ALL MILITARY VETERANS

Recognizing the invaluable contributions of those who have served in the various branches of the United States military is a longstanding tradition in Fountain Hill.

As early as 1928, at the urging of Burgess James Elliot, the borough committee charged with the development of a playground on Stanley Avenue saw fit to include on that site a special memorial to those who had served in World War I. The commemorative marker attached to the cannons that were displayed near the corner of Russell Avenue and North Lynn Street is now posted in the east side of the flagpole at the Stanley Avenue triangle.

With the Fountain Hill Post 406 through the American Legion Department of Pennsylvania, the recognition of the sacrifices of our veterans became much more formalized and publicized. Along with many often unseen support activities for the borough and its citizens, Post 406 organized and funded borough-wide parades for national holidays such as Armistice Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day and Memorial Day. Led by the Post 406 band, the culmination of these events featured speeches, prayers and most often a twenty-one gun salute at Fountain Hill Cemetery, the Broadway Triangle and most recently at the Stanley Avenue Triangle.

Since 1858, the Stanley Avenue Triangle has featured a flag pole sponsored by Post 406 and for special events, an array of white crosses, each one marking one of the wars in which Hillers represented the United States of America. To make this more prominent, Post 406 and the Borough of Fountain Hill are planning to dedicate a new permanent monument to honor the service of borough denizens and all United States citizens who served in our Armed Forces.

The public will be invited to not only attend the dedication services for this substantial new monument when it is completed, but also to purchase inscribed commemorative bricks for its construction
